- Look to the research and what other districts have done...






#### UNIVERSAL SCREENING FOR GIFTED IDENTIFICATION

- Researchers- Dr. Donna Ford, Dr. Nicholas Colangelo, Dr. Susan Assouline, Dr. Chester Finn, Christopher Yaluma, Dr. Adam Tyner, National Association for Gifted Children, Dr. Jack Naglieri, Dr. Joyce Van Tassel-Baska, Dr. Joseph Renzulli, and many others
- Nationally, all minority children and children from poverty are significantly *less likely* to be recommended for referral to evaluation for gifted services
  - Exposure to vocabulary, experiences, and trends in overall rates of referral for screening



## SO, WHAT CAN WE DO?



- Research informs practice in the form of universal screening for gifted identification using a nonverbal assessment
  - Removes reliance on referral from parent, teacher, or anyone else
  - Removes potential bias for limited language proficiency or lack of exposure to environments rich in vocabulary and language
  - •Levels the playing field for all students




#### NAGLIERI NONVERBAL ABILITY TEST (NNAT-3)

- Pine View School partnered with Pupil Support Services to universally screen all Title I 2<sup>nd</sup> graders this fall (n=1127)




#### FREQUENCY DISTRIBUTION BY RACE

  - Receive services at their districted school
  - Attend gifted cluster site
  - Attend gifted magnet program
- Continue to build awareness in communities across district
- Continue to provide support and training to teachers and
  - instructional leaders- setting high expectations for every child
- Consider Rising Scholars programs for those students who were identified as high-ability learners through screening
