Why a Community Plan?

With everything we do to support our children and youth - *and as well as we do it* - kids still fall through the cracks. Just a few facts:

- 1 in 6 high school students have created a plan to commit suicide in the past year
- 30 youth per month are removed from their homes due to parental substance abuse or other neglect.
- 30% of students are not reading on grade level by grade 3
- 18% of youth are not graduating from high school
- 900 school aged youth are homeless

Children spend only a fraction of their time with family compared to a decade ago, leaving parents less time to accomplish an even more daunting task.

The greater a community's investment in its children, the greater return it will realize when they become adults. Supporting families and their children through the first two decades of life helps ensure that youth become valuable resources to the community and its workforce rather than a drain on resources through high cost social programs and lost earning power.

A county-wide Community Plan for Youth provides the framework of a comprehensive approach to support all young people growing to healthy adulthood.

The plan tells our community that:

- leaders have come together around a common cause: children and youth,
- the plan is based on the best thinking and evidence available,
- stakeholders will break out of silos to work across systems and sectors,
- the outcomes achieved will depend on the supports provided, and
- participants and organizations will have tasks and timelines for accountability.

Why do we need this now?

Sarasota County has a long history of nurturing area youth though high quality schools, libraries, sports and non-profit led programs. In spite of all of the good work, barriers and challenges prevent our best efforts from reaching all youth.

Economic realities have forced families and communities to make difficult choices, often preventing youth who need help the most from getting the support they need.


With ambitious local efforts such as the Campaign for Grade Level Reading, Reading Recovery, Talent for Tomorrow, there is increased energy around the success of local

youth. At the same time, the range of initiatives demands a coordinated vision, plan and implementation to optimize resources and opportunities.

What benefits will the community achieve through this planning effort?

- **Budget savings & revenue generation** estimates of savings range from \$170 50,000 per youth from lost wages or use of social services or justice programs.
- **Reduce duplication of services** or more appropriately stated, ensure all youth have access to services.
- Improve direct outcomes for youth and be able to clearly measure the impact.
- Better policy for healthy youth development many communities report significant benefits of alignment of policy from resources to reduction of recidivisim
- Services are relevant & accessible the right program delivered where a youth needs it
- Increase productivity in school one of the most visible signs of success is graduation rate, but grade level reading, state test scores also point to impact.
- Decrease incidents of violence in the community
- Higher rates of voting & volunteerism in young adults
- Prepare current and future leaders

Considering the frameworks that are available through entities such as the National League of Cities Institute for Youth, Education and Families and Forum on Youth Development (Ready by 21), there is no need to invent a model for developing the plan. Instead, proven approaches practiced by other communities can be implemented locally.
